Nature

Noticing a dead Water Shrew in my garden recently, it reminded me that some so-called common mammals can go undetected. In our area you can observe the larger mammals out at sea such as the Grey Seal, Harbour Porpoise, Common Dolphin and Bottle-nosed Dolphin occasionally during the year. Inland you may come across a Roe Deer, Badger or Fox, but the smaller shrews in our own gardens are a mystery to most of us. There are three species in Cornwall and a fourth on the Isles of Scilly. They are small with long snouts, small eyes and velvety fur. The Common and Pygmy Shrews are short-lived creatures and survive around fifteen months. The population in winter consists of youngsters since their parents have died of starvation. Despite its name the Water Shrew can be found far away from water in similar habitat to the other two species. It is the larger of the three and unique in that its bite carries venom that paralyses small prey. Shrews are active by day and night and for the most part spend their time as individuals. Their diet consists mainly of invertebrates and their whole life seems an incessant search for food. Alan Payne

St Germans Parish

By the time this issue is published, we would have had the Literature Festival (Lit Fest), we hope this passes without any major incident and therefore a complete success.

A major change for the area is changes to the boundaries for electoral divisions. The draft proposal is for St Germans to be aligned with Rame and the new area to be called Rame and St Germans; we at the Parish believe the name if this new boundary is adopted should be St Germans and Rame as St Germans has a long standing history and is more recognisable than Rame. We also feel we should have been more aligned with Landrake and Saltash rather than the other way towards Torpoint. Everyone has until the 17th September 2018 to voice their opinions and can have their say at “consultation .lgbce.org.uk” Recently there has been a lot of litter left at the entrance to the car park by the fence next to the RBL. There are also 4 dustbins left there which makes the village look bad to anyone parking or visiting the play park. If you know who is responsible, please ask them to dispose of their waste responsibly. There is also a large amount of litter left in the hedge of the car park, likewise, we provide litter bins which are regularly emptied. On a more positive note, the play area in Treland Park is to be replaced in September as parts are showing signs of wear. The Parish has also put in bids to carry out a feasibility study regarding the White House in St Germans; the other bid is to provide traffic calming in Polbathic Finally, we have all been enjoying the good weather we have had recently but as all gardener know this has devastated the gardens and the Wild Flower Meadow next to the cemetery have been hit by the drought.

News from Cornwall - Richard Pugh

The improvements to the Seaton Drainage and sewerage works are now complete and a final inspection will be completed when we have some rain to test the system. I would like to thank everybody for their understanding during the improvement work and I hope it did not stop anybody enjoying the beauty of the Country Park. The hitching rail on Donderry beach will soon be replaced by eyebolts attached to the seawall and then connected by a chain. This will provide a substantial method to secure boats etc to the sea wall for safety. Cornwall Council will also replace the hand rails up the slope off the beach and will also paint the existing gate. Warm and Well Cornwall (funded by Warm homes fund, SSE and Social landlords) is looking for people and homes without central heating. Cornwall Council is hoping to help private owners and private tenants that have a health issue with first time central heating. Social landlord tenants can also apply through their landlord. Warm and well Cornwall is aimed at anyone in poor health or at the risk of ill health or with underlying health issues or caring for a vulnerable person or worried about your home being cold or damp. Under the Cornwall Council Devolution Deal they have adopted new powers to help households with the greatest need. **Please note you do not have to be in receipt of a benefit to be eligible.** Warm and Well Cornwall have all the answers to sort your heating ready for this winter. Please call 01872 326552 or go to the web link [www.cornwall.gov.uk/warm and well](http://www.cornwall.gov.uk/warm-and-well) Cornwall Council members have agreed to £2.1m for technology improvements in Council car parks as part of the Positive Parking Framework for Cornwall. The Positive Parking Framework includes measures to meet the needs of users and local communities. This will include simplified tariffs, new machines and barriers so drivers can pay on exit, improved signage and consideration of carers who need to park in areas with restricted parking. 
Thursday Club St Germans



Construction Concern


Some Downderry residents are very concerned by the construction and refurbishment work in the village. It is legally not permissible to make construction noise after 8pm on any night of the week, nor before 7am Monday to Friday or before 9am on Saturdays and Sundays. Please can we appeal to those having work done and to contractors to have a little consideration for residents. "

St Germans & Area Public Transport Group



At the Rail Users Group AGM in June it was decided to change our name and widen the focus of interest and activities, so that bus matters are considered alongside trains: this fits well with the Cornwall One Public Transport System policy. We have a long way to go to improve bus links in the Rame peninsula with the station at St Germans. At the meeting, Great Western Railway representatives announced there would be big improvements in the service during 2019 - we have recently heard this is likely to be from May. James Church of Plymouth City Bus reported on the current service patterns. People at the meeting made various comments about current problems and needs, including the importance of a bus to Plymouth via Saltash, the possibility of the 72 being routed through St Germans during the off-peak months, and the need for more robust connection times at Hessenford. We were told the comments would be carefully considered. City Bus subsequently stated that it was 'highly unlikely we would do anything for this winter' when considering the 72 service. 
