

One late afternoon in September and I am scanning the ocean off Downderry.

There is no wind but the sky is murky and visibility is worsening. Still enough light, however, to pick out a party of Balearic Shearwaters. They are spread out in an untidy line and it takes several attempts to count them as individuals disappear momentarily in the gently heaving sea. Finally, I am happy to settle on 27. I have seen more on other occasions but only in flight, so this is a rare opportunity to see so many settled together on the sea and close to land. Nervously, the odd bird takes to the air, circles and rejoins the rest of the flock. Soon, they all take flight and head towards Portwrinkle. These birds are regular visitors to our coast especially from July to October. The species is closely related to the familiar Manx Shearwater that breeds in Britain. As the name suggests the Balearics nest in the Mediterranean; after breeding they pass Gibraltar and head north into the Atlantic. Maybe because of rising sea temperatures we are seeing more of them. What is most significant about the sighting is that the Balearic Shearwater is one of Europe's rarest birds. It breeds colonially in caves in coastal cliffs on islands such as Formentera and has suffered a marked decline as a result of pollution, disturbance and declining food supply. There may be fewer than 2000 pairs remaining, so to see 27 settled on the ocean in one place is a rare privilege. To put this into context, there are over 7 million territories of the Robin in Britain during summer, yet how many might you come across in one day?

I am reminded of other encounters with more familiar, British birds that have suffered a huge decline. Towards the end of April this year, I was walking near Deviock and caught sight of a Turtle Dove. This was a migrant bird, freshly arrived from the south. I could not remember the last one I saw in Britain, but its population has tumbled due to a combination of hunting, drought in Africa and unfavourable agricultural practices here. It is Britain's fastest declining bird. For me, another case of being in the right place at the right time.

The Cirl Bunting, a close relative of the familiar Yellowhammer, is another example of a bird that has experienced a catastrophic drop in numbers and it is now found only in south Devon and in a couple of places in Cornwall. Here, the loss of winter stubble has been a major factor in the decline. For both these birds there is a glimmer of hope as changing practices designed especially for the species are being employed. Rewilding of agricultural land has seen benefits for the Turtle Dove in Sussex for example and numbers of Cirl Buntings here have increased with more beneficial land management especially in winter. However, for the Balearic Shearwater, its future is largely out of our hands. There may be more sightings of them off the Cornish coast, but the future of the species rests firmly with conservation efforts in the Mediterranean.

#### **Deviock Parish Council**

Forthcoming meetings in October (to take place at the Zone, Downderry Methodist Church, unless Covid restrictions change): Full Council 14<sup>th</sup> October 7.30pm, Planning Committee 28<sup>th</sup> October 6.30pm (if required). <u>20mph zone</u> (<u>Downderry</u>): The Parish Council is proposing to consult with residents on this topic; more information to follow. The Highways working party is in the process of prioritising other highways projects in the parish that have previously been put forward.

<u>Changing Places Toilets</u>: Cornwall Council is hoping to receive funding for up to three Changing Places Toilet facilities (those that are accessible to severely disabled people) as part of a funding bid to central Government. Deviock Parish Council has submitted an application for such a facility at Seaton due to its flat location and access to the beach, country park and accessible eating places.

<u>Planning</u>: To comment on a planning application, search for 'cornwall council planning applications'. Any comments posted on the Cornwall Council site are viewed by the Parish Council. See Agendas for applications due for discussion at the next Full Council or Planning Committee meeting.

#### **News from County Hall – Councillor Kate Ewert**



We seem to be fully into Autumn now, the evenings are drawing in and the mornings are getting chilly and Cornwall Council is back in full swing. Following on from my last column, I am pleased to see that the Leader of Cornwall Council, Linda Taylor, has announced a raft of measures to deal with the housing crisis in Cornwall – I am even more pleased that the measures, including a levy on Council

Tax on second homes, enforcing the Right to Buy covenants, looking at planning regulations around change of use for second homes and holiday lets and finally dealing with the Council Tax loophole, are all policies that the Labour Group in Cornwall has been campaigning on for many years.

The news reported this last week that Saltash Swimming Pool could well be up for closure has been shocking and deeply concerning. I have received a huge amount of correspondence about this issue, from individual users, schools, groups and parents concerned about swimming lessons. We have just received a briefing on this consultation, which is to be launched on Weds 22<sup>nd</sup> Sept and will run until Sunday 31<sup>st</sup> October, the consultation is part of a wider Cornwall Leisure facilities review, but the 4 centres at risk will be covered in it. I would heartily recommend all residents that use Saltash pool to engage with the consultation, we need to keep this facility for our

communities, I will share links to it on my Facebook page (search Kate Ewert – Cornwall Cllr for Rame and St Germans). My belief, and that of the Labour Group, is that Cornwall Council has a duty to provide facilities for the health and wellbeing of residents. If a private business cannot successfully run these facilities, then they should be brought back under the management of Cornwall Council for the good of all here.

I am delighted that I have been able to secure funding for a pilot scheme for the residents of Tideford that are worst affected by the poor air quality caused by the heavy traffic through the centre of the village. This scheme will initially run for 12 months and will include real time data capturing devices both inside and outside of homes, that will monitor the air quality 24 hours a day, 7 days a week as well as air filtration units within those homes cleaning the air inside. I know this doesn't fix the problem of the road, but it should hopefully improve the quality of air that residents have to breathe.

My twice monthly Councillor Surgeries are now in full swing and are well attended. Any resident of the Rame Peninsula and St Germans division is welcome to pop in for support and advice with anything Council based. They are held on the first Friday morning of the month in the Rame Centre in Millbrook, and the second Friday morning of each month in Torpoint Library, both from 10-12.

#### **Quay Lane Surgery Practice News**

NHS England has released the latest finding of its GP Patient Survey - a huge ongoing poll involving more than a million people a year. It covers everything from the trust patients have in their doctor, to the attitude of reception staff and how easy it is to get an appointment. NHS England data team crunched the numbers in seven key areas: how easy it is to get an appointment, whether opening times are convenient, whether people trust the GP, whether the GP listens to them, whether the GP treats them with care and concern, whether receptionists are helpful, and how patients rate their overall experience.

## Quay Lane Surgery has again been voted the 'Best Practice in East Cornwall', is now rated the '3rd Best Practice in Cornwall' and ranked in the 'Top 2% of 'Best Practices in England'!

<u>Staff Retirement and Recruitment</u>. We say a fond farewell to Janet, who has worked at Quay Lane Surgery as a receptionist for 18 years. We would like to wish her the very best of health and happiness in her retirement. We also said goodbye to Tracey, our Diabetic Nurse, as she moves on to pastures new. <u>Flu Season 2021</u>. Due to national delays with deliveries our clinics might be slightly later than normal; we can confirm that your flu vaccination has been ordered so it is important to have yours at our surgery. Vaccinations will be offered to patients aged 50 and over and those aged 49 and under in an 'at risk' group. #### News from DaSRA Downderry & Seaton Residents Association



Speed Limits through the village. Many of the residents who responded to DaSRA's request to share their priority concerns with County Councillor Armand Toms highlighted the need for speed restrictions by way of a 20mph speed limit. This was an agenda item at Deviock Parish Council's September meeting when Councillors agreed to take the issue further with Cornwall Council. Cllr Toms stressed the importance of local support for such measures so residents' views will be sought.

<u>Looe Hill</u>. A group of residents living on Looe Hill has been campaigning for some time for Cornwall Council to monitor the level of erosion of a vulnerable section of Looe Hill. Cornwall Council's contractor, Cormac, has released the results of a ground investigation that they have implemented over the past 10-11 months to better understand the nature of instability affecting the road. The report sets out their methods and findings: periodic visual inspection of the highway and adjacent coastal slope to

identify any signs of deterioration, developing instability, etc; pin readings of previously identified cracking in the highway (no significant changes over the monitoring period to date, no new cracks observed); inclinometer deflection readings taken at borehole locations. The readings to date do not suggest that significant slope movements have occurred over the past 10-11 months.

Cormac did find some evidence to suggest highway surface water run-off overtopping the edge of the highway is causing local and gradual shallow sloughing (the existence of an ~150mm drop adjacent to the leaning fence) of the vegetated highway verge/crest opposite one of the installed boreholes (BH1) and this is contributing towards the fence bowing visibly outwards. The available field evidence observed elsewhere along the slope span in addition to the inclinometer measurements taken to date (measuring slope deformation), supports this conclusion with the reported defects (highway cracking, bowing fence) not attributed to a potential deep-seated global instability mechanism at present. Tension cracks visible in the road surface course may be related to a combination of tensions induced by the bowing fence, shallow erosional failure and likely subordinate vehicle loading of the pavement as it is a very well used road. Tension cracks haven't noticeably changed in length or aperture over the monitoring period.

The cumulative results of the monitoring program will be reviewed with Cornwall Council in Autumn 2021 and at this point a decision will be made on next steps. Two of the borehole installations allow monitoring by inclinometer and therefore the collection of readings can be resumed at any point should any signs of significant instability be identified at a later date. While the residents have welcomed evidence that sloughing is not due to deep-seated rock instability at present, they propose an active response to the review to ensure that measures are immediately taken to prevent overtopping. of please future To keep aware updates, follow www.dasra.co.uk/campaigns/looe-hill-coastal-erosion or email info@dasra.co.uk.





#### Simple ways to save the planet – in autumn!

I was reminded yesterday that the current crisis is not just environmental, but also ecological. To me, the two go hand in hand; reduced emissions will mean cleaner air, and a healthier planet. But, of course, the most effective way of improving air quality is to add plants of all sizes, and the best and easiest way of doing so is to plant a hedge.



Hedges are great. They are versatile and can be slipped onto a boundary where they will need little attention other than the occasional trim. There they will add a living windbreak, privacy, a home for birds, and a climbing frame for ivy, which is one of the best wildlife plants of all. Traditionally, a few trees would be allowed to grow taller and become standards, offering shade, structure and another layer of habitat. These standards could be oaks, which support a greater number of life forms than any other tree, fruit trees such as damsons, perfect for late summer foraging, or hawthorns, with their fabulous pollinator friendly blossoms and bird nourishing haws. Hedges also provide enormously important wildlife corridors, food and shelter for birds and small mammals in the winter, and blossom in the spring.

If you don't yet have a hedge, but do have a little space in your garden, now is the time to start planning. Bare-rooted hedge bundles can be planted between November and March. There are many companies offering wildlife friendly mixes of hawthorn, crab apple, field maple, blackthorn, bird cherry, hazel, guelder rose and dog rose. I planted a boundary hedge six years ago which is now a colourful, busy place that is a joy to behold.

If you already have a hedge, it is worth layering it for optimum wildlife benefit. I am lucky enough to have champion hedge-laying father, but if you don't have one of these, then Duchy college offers a two day course. If you are in the fortunate position of owning a small holding or larger piece of land, then allowing your hedges to grow big and bushy will protect field margins from excess run-off and offer a home for birds that predate on crop pests, reducing the need for sprays.

So, in a nutshell, grow and celebrate hedges. Instead of a feeding station, give birds a home and sustenance in one package. Rejoice in those bushy tangles of hawthorn, hazel and ivy, for they will provide food for the future for all kinds of wildlife long after we can.

#### **Community Bus News**



Welcome back to all who have been travelling on the Community Bus since we re-started operations, and to those who haven't, we hope to see you soon.

We are almost back on our full schedule, which means weekly services to Plymouth (Tuesdays) and to Liskeard (Thursdays), we have resumed our services to Truro, Tavistock, Totnes and Exeter (all departures normally at 09.30), and we have reinstated our popular excursions. For the safety of our passengers and our drivers we are insisting that **all** passengers using the bus must have had their two Covid vaccinations and also that **all** passengers using the bus must wear face masks throughout their journey.

During October we have trips planned to Exeter on Wednesday October 6, Tavistock on Wednesday October 13 and to Truro on October 20. In addition we are making an

excursion to Dartmouth Food Festival on Friday October 22. Please note that the Tavistock run was originally planned as a visit to the Goose Fair. Unfortunately, the event has been cancelled by the Tavistock Town Council, so it will be a normal Tavistock service that day.

Now some dates further out for your diaries. In November we will be going back to Tavistock on November 12, to Truro on November 17 and to the Fowey Christmas Market on November 26. The following month it will be Exeter on December 1, the Tavistock Dickensian Evening on December 3, Truro late night shopping on December 8 and Truro again on December 15.

Finally, a special plea for help. We have received a request from some interested parents in Seaton for us to reinstate the weekdays early morning service from Seaton to Downderry timed to bring children from Seaton to St Nicolas School. We operated this service for many years during school terms, until the pandemic stopped all our operations. At that point the service was actually starting to fail because of insufficient demand. We are anxious now to gauge potential support, if we were to reinstate this service. So, if you are interested for you or your children to use such a service, could you please get in touch. My contact details are below. Obviously the conditions about facemasks and vaccinations would not apply to young passengers.

#### St Germans & Area Public Transport User Group

Local Bus Services. As from the 6<sup>th</sup> September all school bus services in our area will revert to being able to carry adult fare paying adult passengers. This will include the new extended 172 Torpoint - Callywith College (Bodmin) Service. On the outward journey, on schooldays only, this bus will depart from Torpoint Ferry at 07.15, only stopping in our parish at The Cross, Crafthole at 07.31, and then via Downderry, Widegates, East Looe, Pelynt & East Taphouse to arrive at the college at 08.57. The return journey will depart Callywith College at 16.25, calling at East Looe Surgery at 17.10, Downderry at 17.31 before arriving at The Cross at 17.42 and terminating at Torpoint Ferry at 18.01. Due to anticipated additional student numbers using the route, an additional school bus is to be deployed between Millbrook & Torpoint Community College in the mornings and afternoons. Other welcome news is that the Parish Council has purchased a much needed new replacement bus shelter with a free standing bench, that is due to be erected at The Cross in the near future, thanks in part to the Parish Council being successful in obtaining a bus shelter grant from Cornwall Council.

There are minor, and for some people useful, changes to the 71 bus route. It now goes via the Carkeel roundabout, with a stop outside Lidl's (easy to get to Waitrose from there as well). There's still a stop outside Saltash library and leisure centre. The 75 bus service through Downderry and Seaton needs improving in various ways, and especially with the connecting services to Plymouth. Rame Peninsula Public Transport Users Group (RPPTUG) have put forward proposals to Cornwall Council and Go Cornwall Bus for a new demand responsive bus service based at St. Germans Station and the St. Germans & Area Passenger Transport Group is now progressing a feasibility study based on extensive public surveys etc. Bearing in mind the Governments new £3 Billion Bus Strategy in which Cornwall Council have, like other local authorities in conjunction with local bus companies, a duty to put forward Bus Service Improvement Plans that they have to publish by the end of October, we took the opportunity to put forward some suggestions. These included:- (i) a proposed improved No. 75 Bus Service that would give Downderry & Seaton with a population of 1,300, who rely on the 75 as their only regular daily bus route, a better service that would include at least two through buses on weekdays each way to Plymouth, (ii) The reinstatement of a Sunday Bus Service from Plymouth to Looe/Polperro, via Torpoint, Portwrinkle, Downderry & Seaton, possibly linked to a special day ticket enabling holders to use the railway in one direction between Looe & Plymouth. We continued to press for the reinstatement of the late night bus service from Plymouth to call at Sheviock & Crafthole, and for the need of RPTI (Real passenger Time Information) at locations in our area where this important facility has not yet been installed. However, it needs to be stated that most of our area has a very good bus service provided by one of the best operators in Go Cornwall Bus, part of the Go Ahead Group. The next RPPTUG Committee Meeting will be held on the 19th October in the Freathy Community Hall. Please remember that travellers are being encouraged to still wear face masks on Public Transport, that makes it safer for everyone.

<u>National Express Coaches</u>. There is further good news in that since the 2<sup>nd</sup> August National Express have been operating coaches in Cornwall to and from Birmingham for the first time since Covid restrictions commenced in March 2020. This reopens up much more of the N.E. network from Cornwall, as from Birmingham you can connect into their services operating to & from the North East, North West & Scotland.


Consequently, there are now five daily services calling at the Tideford Bus Shelters in the up direction, namely the 00.48 & the 10.30 to Birmingham plus the 06.15, 14.30 & 22.33 to London Victoria via Heathrow Airport. Similarly, there are five daily return bus services that call at Tideford en route to Penzance. Unfortunately, National Express again did not give any advance notice about the services to Birmingham, so anyone making enquiries on the N. E. Website up to only a few days before the 2<sup>nd</sup> August, would not have been made aware of the important impending changes.

From Plymouth Coach station there are of course other additional National Express Coach Services to London & Birmingham as well the frequent Stagecoach Falcon Bus Service to Bristol Airport & City Centre where it connects into Stagecoach Megabus Services to London, Cardiff, Birmingham, Manchester & Sunderland. For further information please use the National Express Travel Planner or telephone 08717818181, and for Stagecoach Falcon & Megabus services telephone 01413524444.

<u>Train Services</u>. Train services continue to be good generally, although there are still cancellations from time to time because of train staff having to isolate under Covid regulations. Overall, in the last few weeks, numbers of passengers travelling between Plymouth and Penzance have been similar to pre-Covid days.

Recently, a Flexi season ticket has been introduced on GWR. It provides passengers with 8 days of travel in 28 days – at any time (including peak periods) between two named stations. The 8 days of travel do not need to be specified in advance, and this gives part-time commuters more flexibility to travel when they want and need. It gives a 20% saving in fares. Flexi season tickets are available as a Smartcard ticket which you can buy at GWR.com, on the GWR app or from ticket offices. Check the website for details.

#### The story behind the 1840 Tithe Map

Our map spent nearly all of its formative years as 24 sheets of A4. The day it got assembled - the big reveal - was so exciting. At last the parish landscape appeared with all its wooded valleys, shoreline, settlements and the great turnpike road carving across the web of ways that went before it. The Cornish manors became defined. The Norman Church has commandeered the entire hill around it, sweeping away the Saxon settlement of Maristowe. This was the Norman Conquest in action. Tithes could be collected and paid to the Conqueror; produce stored in the tithe barn. (You can see this on Lidar in Barn Park.)

Little glimpses of past lives appear in the **field names** - where the Cornish plays were held; the site of Midsummer Bonfires; where there were barrows, hay-yards, wood for wainscotting. We had a defensive wall and beacons. There were watermills, a windmill, quarries, pits and a vineyard.

The **field numbers** refer to the Tithe Apportionment, written in copperplate, showing area and ownership. This gives the names of leaseholders - a haven for **genealogists!** All the plots in Looe are numbered but too small on our map. A bigger scale map would make a great resource for Looe historians. I am arranging to make photocopies and the CD available in the **Looe Library**.

The oldest names are the **river names**, the Frome, Bunny, Kennal. Side, Sarre and Dover. They are Celtic river names used across Europe before the Romans 2000 years ago at least.

Some tithe maps are printed and coloured. Ours only had red for habitation. But the colour-coding on this version means you can see the pattern of land-holding (all bounded by watercourses). This complements historic leases etc. The Duchy lands have been surveyed and recorded. Pendrym had a succession of absentee landlords leaving archives in St Ives, Dorset, Mount Edgecombe, Courtney Library, Sheviock and more. Cornwall Record Office has a wealth of information. There is much more to discover!

The map fills a gap in the local history and is screaming out for further research. Teachers, home-schoolers, budding historians, photographers with drones, archaeologists and geologists can all expand on the information which is 180 years old already. **The Victoria Bookshop** in Looe has fascinating local publications which could do with a map! The **library** has existing history books of Looe. The internet is revealing a wealth of new research. Last week I discovered that an ancestor helped rebuild Tregoad and Barbican!

I'm hoping our map will inspire other parishes to create their own map. I shall be sending them out as **Christmas presents!** Big thanks to Jon Puckey of A2Z Printers for the design and to our Parish Council for the support..

So put your hand up if you think we should have a SPOT THE SPELLING MISTAKE competition? I know the answer. Someone spotted it! Must do better!
