

Sitting in the garden one pleasant afternoon in March many years ago, my attention was drawn to a gentle snoring. Since there were no human candidates in the vicinity, I continued to listen and moved quietly towards the origin of the noise. At the bottom of a fence, protected by plenty of vegetation was a sleeping hedgehog. Pleasantly surprised, I left it in peace, but it had moved on the following day. Fast forward more than a decade later and I have not come across another hedgehog in the garden until a few days ago; despite the fact that barely a hundred metres away a neighbour has had frequent encounters with hedgehogs.

Outside one evening after dark, I hear some snuffling near the edge of the garden. I recognize the sound immediately and confirm the identity with a torch, trying not to be too intrusive. There are two cautious individuals who sense my presence, but have no idea how elated I am. Vision is poor so hedgehogs rely on smell. Perhaps having a new fence has been helpful, since this one has small gaps at the base and this enables the animals to move from garden to garden. I know that my neighbour has encouraged other residents to open up just a small gap at the bottom of their adjoining fences in order to facilitate movement. Slowly the network of hedgehog-friendly gardens is growing. Perhaps it should be a mandatory requirement of every garden.

I try my luck again the next evening at the same location. There is now a bowl of food. I hear the rustle of vegetation and a small individual emerges. It dithers on its path to the bowl, then completely ignores it. The following evening, I catch the sound of bristles rubbing against the foot of the fence and a different, larger hedgehog arrives. It pokes around, crunches at something and then gets to the bowl. This animal thoroughly enjoys the food and the next morning the bowl is empty.

Hedgehogs travel very widely, males more so than females, at least until the end of the breeding season. The range of each individual's movement will overlap with those of

others. Males do not defend territories like birds do and will not expend too much energy trying to defend their own patch. They may be a little defensive in their immediate surroundings, but do not defend an extensive area. There is some evidence to suggest that while some hedgehogs may visit your garden over many weeks or years, younger males, in particular. may turn up just once. So, you may have more visitors than imagined.

We are all aware that the population of hedgehogs has declined, so we can all do our bit to support them in our gardens. The vagaries of the weather, availability of nest-sites and food, predation and the use of pesticides have all hindered the survival of the animals. It is easy to think that frequent road-kills indicate a problem, but that can be too simplistic. More likely the fall in population owes more to farming practices and pollution. A larger, chemically-treated field reduces the amount of invertebrate food available, which may encourage animals to move to grass verges closer to roads. As for gardeners, there is no point putting out food for hedgehogs if we then treat our lawns with pesticides. It is also naïve to think that slug pellets will only kill slugs. As always, we have to consider the bigger picture, including links with our neighbours. The hedgehogs will appreciate our thoughtfulness.

Planning permission had been received in 2021. <u>Planning</u>: To comment on a planning application, search for 'cornwall council planning applications'. Any comments posted on the Cornwall Council site are viewed by the Parish Council. See Agendas for applications due for discussion at the next Planning Committee meeting.

#### News from New County Hall

Dentist Provision for Cornwall. Back in December 2010 the NHS dentist in Looe closed its doors and the residents were left to seek their own dentist. Whilst some were lucky and got NHS dentists nearby, many were scattered to surgeries from Tavistock to Bodmin and the majority to private practices. Also, in 2010 a dental school opened at Treliske Hospital in Truro to train dentists. This school trains enough dentists to keep Cornwall over-supplied with dentists, but many choose to move away when they complete their training. This leaves 65 dental practices in Cornwall - if averaged over the population this is over 8k patients per practice. As readers will know, the population of Cornwall is struggling financially with 395k of residents in the most 50% of deprived wards whilst only 161k are in the least 50% of deprived wards. In January 2021 there were 31,496 on the waiting list for an NHS dentist and in February 2022 there were 37,059 - a large increase. The lead officer in the SW for dentistry is working hard on this issue but from the figures above more needs to be done. Solutions are needed to keep newly trained dentists in Cornwall. We need more practices for NHS dentists and these can be run by other NHS organisations like Cornwall Foundation Trust and even a Primary Care Network, whilst the Senior Leadership Team at Cornwall Council should be supporting any initiative to bring NHS dental provision to Cornwall. As a member of the Health Scrutiny Committee at Cornwall Council I will continue to keep this important item on the agenda and keep fighting for more NHS dental provision for Cornwall. https://www.nhs.uk/nhs-services/dentists/how-to-findan-nhs-dentist/

<u>Protests</u>. I see there is a new protest group 'Tamar Toll Action' angry about the 30% raise in tolls for the Tamar Bridge. In my view they have a valid point as there is much talk about levelling up and whilst the toll bridges in Wales and Scotland have had their tolls removed those in England have not. There are around 600 people in the Liskeard and Looe areas who travel to Plymouth to work each day and it has a direct impact on their income. There will also be a protest about the high increases in the fuel price on the 24th of June again at the Tamar Bridge at 5pm which is sandwiched between the rail strikes on the 23rd and 25th of June.

<u>Your Hedge</u>. Just a reminder, be a good neighbour if your hedge abuts a footpath it should be kept clear for 3m on the boundary of your property that adjoins the path. If it is a highway, it should be 5m clear at the edge of your property. This allows for vehicles to pass safely.



<u>Community Notice Board</u>. An apology to all those wanting to put up posters on the board in the centre of Downderry in recent weeks. Within a couple of days of each other, the two latches being turned to open the front door broke away - first the top and then the bottom latch, rendering the door impossible to open. "That's never happened before" says the manufacturer, so it does not hold spare parts. It is awaiting delivery of new latches from France. At the time of writing this copy, no firm delivery date has been set, but we will do all we can to have it repaired as soon as possible. It is so disappointing, especially as we have had such positive comments about the Notice Board.

Deviock Neighbourhood Development Plan. We know that many residents are interested to hear more about the priorities identified in the Parish's plan which is currently in the final stages of review before its publication. While we must stress that it is unlikely that the formal review will be finalised by mid-July, and therefore the final plan will not be available, we do think that DaSRA's AGM gives an ideal opportunity to present residents with some background to the submission of the plan, in preparation for its forthcoming publication. Only then will the key policies be detailed for analysis by the community ahead of a local referendum. Our Parish and County Cllrs cannot yet confirm the publication date, but as there will be much to consider in adopting the Plan, perhaps a greater understanding of how the Plan was compiled will be useful to residents. We appreciate the Cllrs' agreement to join us at **DaSRA's AGM which will be held at the Village Hall at 7.00pm on Monday 18th July.** 

DaSRA Membership. DaSRA is run by residents for residents, and our Annual General Meeting gives subscribed members the opportunity to vote for residents to serve on DaSRA's Management Committee. It is important for a residents association to have the stated support of residents in representing them on matters that impact the wider community and signing-up enables a direct line of communication. ## Neighbourhood Watch in partnership with DaSRA

It was good to meet some of our long-standing supporters and recruit some new members at the Downderry and Seaton Village Groups meeting last month. Whilst we appreciate that we live in a low crime area, it is by supporting each other we can nip problems in the bud before they become a



real crime. We are fortunate to have some police officers living in our midst and their support is gratefully received when on-duty officers are unavailable due to higher priorities. One of our concerns is speed through the villages. Speeding is high on the priority for both County and Parish Councils and following a recent accident in a 20 mph zone close to St Nicolas School I am investigating Community Speed Watch. Heads up - Malware is a catch-all term for any type of malicious software designed to harm or exploit any programmable device or network and a current one to be aware of is racking up high phone bills for victims. Named SMSFactory, it infiltrates Android phones and uses trickery to hide itself on the device so the victim is unaware of the damage being done. So, what to look out for and what preventative measure to take: This malware sneakily taps money from victims by sending premium text messages (SMS) and making calls to premiumrate phone numbers undetected. One version is also capable of extracting victims' contact lists, spreading the malware further. The malware is disguised as an app which people can download and the malware relies on the user forgetting about the app on their phone so they are unaware of the financial damage until they receive their phone bill. Tips on how to avoid mobile malware like SMSFactory : 1. Stick to official app stores. 2. Install an antivirus on your mobile device 3. Remain vigilant and remain cautious when downloading new apps, 4. Disabling premium SMS features - or at least setting a limit - significantly limits the potential impact of campaigns like this. 
