

Away from the coast as I return home, the trees along one road are alive with birds unperturbed by the drizzle. Blackbird, Collared Dove and Jackdaw share the same wire in a tolerant mood. Below in the foliage, the tits and finches are more belligerent as they chase each other around profitable positions. There are plenty of excited calls from birds but actual birdsong is much diminished now. The obvious exception is the Robin which sings its wintry anthem loudly from a favourite perch. Then the movement of a tiny bird catches my attention. Frustratingly, for a few seconds, it hides from view. Patience prevails however, as the bird obligingly shows itself. It is a Firecrest, a winter visitor and a jewel of a bird, which I usually see in October as the species moves west into milder climes. In the following minutes I come across a couple of other migrants, a Blackcap and a Chiffchaff, much commoner than the Firecrest. They may stay for a while or move on, but all three are part of the local fauna for the next few months as they pass through our gardens.

and Kittiwakes to be seen. The former will soon fly back to the Mediterranean whilst the latter move into the open ocean. The odd diver from the north has already flown

by and their numbers will build up over the winter.

Later in the afternoon, along the coast above the rock armour, the sun emerges and the brief warmth encourages a couple of migrant Clouded Yellow butterflies to take flight. On settling, this species rests with closed wings and almost disappears from view. It

has been a good year for the butterfly and this particular grassy site is a favourite haunt. Each year individuals will have flown from southern Europe. They will attempt to breed here and overwinter, but rarely succeed in wet and cooler Britain. There is also a Holly Blue, sunning itself on the slope. This butterfly has two broods each year, the caterpillars feeding on holly in spring and ivy in autumn. A Kestrel hovers close by, seemingly happy to show off its hunting prowess just metres away, its body quite still between fast-beating wings.

Nearer home I have been keeping an eye on a wasp's nest, but I notice that the buzzing audible over the last few weeks is now reduced. Around the large patches of ivy in the hedgerow, there are fewer autumnal Ivy Bees hovering around the source of nectar, but they are easily outnumbered by the Honey Bees. Changes will continue over the next few weeks as we move closer to winter.

St Germans Parish Council

You may have noticed that entire Country of Wales and now our County Council are changing advice on speed limits in villages. The trial areas have proved very successful. This is because statistics show that a pedestrian hit by a car at 20 mph has a one in ten mortality rate when hit at 30 mph four in ten and when hit at 40 mph it is eight in ten.

Changing the speed sign will not reduce speed alone. The Parish Council have commissioned a feasibility study for the village and we would like to know your views on the proposals. To this end we have booked the Eliot Hall on Monday 20th and Wednesday 23rd of November from 2:00 until 8:00 p.m. This is not a consultation on what we have decided but we are genuinely seeking your opinions before any proposal reaches the next stage as we want to know what is acceptable.

There will be large posters of plans and Councillors will be there to take down your views. This is your chance to influence the way forward so do not miss it. There will be posters put up as a reminder nearer the day.

Tideford already has a 20mph limit on Church Road but we have asked for speed monitoring to take place to get statistics on the problem before we look further.

Tideford play park documents have not arrived but we are looking at quotes at the moment to plan the way to restore the facility to normal use.

We have a vacancy for a Councillor in St Germans if you are at all interested, please get in touch. Due to the change of Clerk, the phone will now be operational on Tuesday and Thursday from 9;00 until 12;00. The address and email remain the same.

30th Anniversary Twinning visit to Plouguerneau, Brittany: The Chair, Cllr Mark Gibbons, attended the event on behalf of the parishes in response to an invitation from the Mayor of Plouguerneau. Cllr Gibbons joined members of the St Germans and District Twinning Association and their counterparts in France to celebrate this important milestone.

Quay Lane Surgery - Practice News

We have received positive feedback about our new telephone system to include:

'I have found the new telephone system far less frustrating when ringing the surgery for an appointment at 8.30am'.

'It is easier to get through to the practice on the telephone and saves repeated re-dialing'.

Being cloud based means we can access statistics to include the number of inbound and outbound calls daily and average call times. These were the statistics for a random week during the last month:

Inbound calls received into the surgery	Outbound calls made from the surgery	Total % of patients contacting the surgery	Average call time
1100	408	24.7%	2m 21sec

When we tell patients that demand is high and that we are incredibly busy, we are not making it up! These figures highlight just how high demand is. Almost a quarter of our entire surgery patients contacted the surgery just in one week, and the surgery team also made over 400 calls to patients. Due to demand, we are experiencing longer waits for routine appointments with the GPs. Please think twice about whether you need to contact the surgery or book a GP appointment.

Can you treat your new condition with over the counter - medication first? Ask to see our Physio if you have joint, shoulder or back pain or have a sports injury? Ask to see our Social Prescriber if you need help completing forms for benefits?

If you are not sure what condition you have, or how severe it is, you can either ring 111 or use the NHS 111 symptom checker. The checker will answer questions about your main symptoms, help you find out when and where to get help and arrange for you to be contacted by a Nurse, if needed. DaSRA - Downderry & Seaton Residents Association

Report illegal parking: DaSRA consistently raises concerns voiced by residents over bad and illegal parking with our local Deviock Parish Council. A recent meeting between Cornwall Council's (CC) Highways and Parking Enforcement team and our County and Parish councillors, gave an opportunity for a greater understanding of each other's challenges and helped to identify some practical steps. Parking restrictions have to be enforced to be effective, and CC has been operating with a greatly reduced team in SE Cornwall this summer, with only 3 enforcement officers covering much of the coast, including our area. CC is hopeful that a recruitment drive will resolve this situation before next summer. In reality, CC bases its assessment of where to focus its officers to a great extent on the number of reports received from the public. At busy times they might expect 20-30 such reports but received only 7 in August and 2 in July from Downderry and Seaton. As a result, CC was unaware of the scale of the problem in our villages. DPC has agreed to notify the enforcement team if particularly high visitor numbers are expected, especially during the summer months and bank holidays, and CC agreed to respond by allocating additional officers, whenever possible. But CC needs to know of the problem. To have effective enforcement it is important that members of the public report violations to attract attention, and resources, to address parking problems in Downderry and Seaton. So, if you see an illegally parked car, or one parked in such a potential incident, do consider going cause a place to www.cornwall.gov.uk/report-something to alert Cornwall Council of your concern.

Neighbourhood Watch in partnership with DaSRA

October has been a busy month for our flower boaters and we were fortunate to have a quantity of spring bulbs donated by Cormac. Watch this space next spring!

Sadly, we have received reports of residents being targeted by scammers so below are a sample of the latest scams to be aware of. You can find details of how to report by reading the neighbourhood watch monthly news at info@dasra.co.uk or search for the Neighbourhood Watch online site and if you find the information useful you can subscribe and stay up to date via alerts to your in box. Be on the lookout for these scams and remember, If you, or someone you know, has been a victim, report it.

Friend in Need: A 'friend in need 'scam is targeting Whatsapp users. Criminals are posing as friends or family members in need of help. They will text from what they claim to be a new mobile after their old one was 'lost/damaged'. They will then go on to ask for money to pay an urgent bill/new phone. Recent scams have even initially asked for funds to be transferred to a friend or family member before being sent on to the scammer to give the appearance of an initial low risk payment. One local resident can confirm how authentic this scam is, having responded urgently out of concern for a relative.

New Omicron Jab: The new Omicron Covid vaccine is being rolled out, as the UK becomes the first country to approve the specifically tailored jab, ahead of fears for winter spikes. With the rollout for the latest booster, there are concerns that covid related fraud may increase as a result, with criminals targeting potential victims with vaccine scams, not too dissimilar to the ones seen previously.

Energy Price Cap: With the severe increase in the energy price cap reported, fraudsters are likely to seize this opportunity to exploit those looking to change energy provider and/or tariffs. Individuals are being warned to be vigilant to new campaigns associated with energy supplies, for examples offers which seem too good to be true or fake rebates.

Cost of Living Crisis: With the cost-of-living crisis deepening, scammers will be using the economic downturn to their own benefit. The warning comes as many are due to receive a first instalment of a cost-of-living payment, worth £326. Reports have been received by Action Fraud of fraudsters attempting to exploit vulnerable people with the promise of money saving schemes, including, energy and council tax rebates or by encouraging individuals to apply/ claim a 'cost of living payment 'via text, followed by an email to gain further information from the victim.

Fake Santander Email: Lots of people online have been flagging a fake Santander mobile banking email. The email impersonates Santander's branding and gives you a sense of urgency regarding your access to banking services, to pressure you into giving away data. Over the past week, use of the search term 'Santander email scams 'has increased by more than 5000%, showing the spike in people being targeted with this new scam.

British Gas Fake Email: Scammers are impersonating British Gas with fake emails tempting recipients to click a link to get a fake energy refund. Although the email looks legitimate, it addresses you by your email address and not your name. This is a potential giveaway that it's from a fraudster.

Premium Rate Number Scams: This scam tries to trick people who are searching online for telephone numbers of government advice services. It works by displaying an advert for the phone number of the relevant government advice line. But the sting is that you'll be charged a premium for using this advertised telephone number – in some cases, as much as £20 or £30 a call. You are put through to the right advice line, but you pay a very high and unnecessary connection fee.

The November Recycling for Charity collection at the Eliot Arms Pub Car Park will take place on Sunday 20th from 10:30-11:30.



St Germans & Area Public Transport Group - Public Transport Survey Report

The Survey Report was presented at our public meeting in October, and has been forwarded to bus and train companies, Cornwall Council, Parish Councils, Community Rail Network and others. We are particularly grateful to GWR and Community Rail Network for funding the survey, and we received generous donations also from the Cornwall Council's Community Chest (via County Councillors Kate Ewert and Armand Toms), St Germans Community shop, and from Parish Councils. Thanks very much to all those supporting the survey and many thanks to the fieldworkers who helped to gather responses to the survey, whether on-line or on paper.

401 responses were analysed. We have information from respondents, regarding village or hamlet of residence, ages, size of families, car ownership, employment status, health and mobility. The survey gives us data on patterns of public transport use - bus, train or both; destinations, purpose, time and frequency and the use of St Germans station - including travel to and from the station, parking etc. We also gathered important data about how people get information about trains and buses (times etc) and how that could be improved (e.g. real-time displays at bus stops). There was overwhelming support for a future integrated transport system, as an alternative to car, and people were positive about how often they would use such a system.


The next steps are to feed the survey results (and follow-up data) back to bus and train operators, councils etc and to ask for their responses. We will share these results with the general public, the public transport users. Our group will continue to work for better parking at St Germans station, we'll still print timetables, and will be seeking to develop better bus timetable information, with a possible facebook page.

One of the survey respondents advised that we should "innovate slowly, and have people involved in the scheduling who actually live in the area (or know it well)". We think this is great advice: our plan is to create profiles of use and demand by 'age' and 'geography', and to set up focus groups with those that were under-represented in the survey. We will explore existing integrated public transport projects in the UK and try to develop a prototype for integrating public transport in our area based on existing bus and train services, as well as community buses. This, we think, will include drawing on a range of different funding pools and volunteer groups. Perhaps routes and volunteering should be organised in terms of age and demand? Key routes might be a Plymouth to Peninsula night bus, a Peninsula region bus, Peninsula train links, schools links, groups and clubs links – alongside 'special trips' and more widely advertised 'dial a bus'. BUT all this will need to be done in consultation especially with passenger transport businesses and with potential users. Ambitious? Yes, but we can give it a go!

Simple Ways to Save the Planet

Trees are amazing. They breathe in carbon dioxide, and give us oxygen in return. They provide shade in hot weather, and shelter in wet. What is there not to love about a tree? But how often do we really stop and observe, and appreciate them?



All trees host a variety of life, from insects, to birds, small mammals, ferns, mosses and lichens. Some will be specialists; they may not support a wide range of species, but for those they do they are essential. Others, like the oak, are superheroes, hosting a massive 342 different species of invertebrate, and offering 600 years of wildlife value - 200 growing, 200 at maturity, and 200 as it slowly dies and provides habitat rich deadwood. The ivy that trees support also is a wildlife superhero, with flowers offering late pollen and nectar to the ivy bee, which has designed its life cycle around the ivy flowering period, and for many other pollinators. Later ivy seeds are valuable winter feed for birds.

Sadly, many of our trees are sick; the pathogen *phytophthora ramorum* has destroyed larch plantations and many fine conifers, and ash die-back is now so prevalent there will soon be very little ash left in our hedges and woods. Droughts and other extreme weather events bought on by climate change are putting stress on our trees. So how do we connect more with trees? What can we do to protect them?

A friend had an inspired suggestion that if every person were to informally adopt a tree or two, this would be wonderfully beneficial. There would be no need to own this tree. Simply chose a tree near to where you live, in a park or a hedge, and start to observe what you see. Get up close. At this time of year you may find abandoned nests. Where wood has been damaged can you see insects? What visits the tree? What is growing on it?

Spend some time with your tree. Draw small details, or write a bit of poetry or prose. With all art forms it doesn't matter if it's good or not - it's about the doing and the creativity that provides connectivity. If your tree is a young sapling you could keep an eye for drought stress and give it a bucket of water every once in a while. For an older tree, become its protector. Moving forward preserving what we have is an enormously important factor in tackling climate change.

Of all the fruit trees, the apple has the greatest wildlife benefit. If you don't have an apple tree in your garden, but have space, do think about planting one this winter. Now is also a good time to order bare rooted hedge plants.

So, pick a tree and adopt it this winter. Watch it as the seasons change. Make a note of when the leaves come out, and when the last ones drop. How many species of flora and fauna does it support? When does it flower? A healthy tree is a gift that keeps on

giving, and getting to know one really well is a pleasure that is readily accessible to all.

Here are a few of my favourite tree facts:

- Many trees are monoecious. This means they have both male and female parts on the same tree. The hazel is a good example. Look in spring for tiny red female flowers along the stem, that will be wind pollinated by the male golden yellow catkins.
- Historically the elder was known as the mother tree. Every part of the elder has beneficial medicinal qualities.
- Sweet Chestnuts were introduced into the UK by the Romans, who used their fruit to make flour.
- The holm oak is named after the ancient word for holly, on account of its evergreen leaves.
- The Fortingall Yew in Perthshire is the oldest living tree in the UK, believed to be between 2000-3000 years old. Locally, in Dartington there is a yew that is over 1500 years old.
