

Nature Notes - Two Tales from Winter

A few days before Christmas and the challenging dry, icy conditions have been swept away by equally unwelcome southerly gales and heavy rain. I decide to take the path along the river rather than use the local lanes for an early walk. It is less exposed surrounded by trees in the valley and, although the swollen river is running high, I hope that the path is passable. A few birds are calling but they remain hidden or create silhouettes in the ominous gloom above. No chance of a kingfisher in these conditions. Glancing downstream, I glimpse a dark sinuous shape emerging from the water, just its head and back at first facing upstream and towards me. I am a few metres away from an otter. It disappears and for a few seconds I turn my gaze upstream and downstream hoping I have not lost the moment. Thankfully, the otter re-emerges close to the far bank shielded by a fallen log. I move tentatively to obtain a better view and now it is mostly out of the water tackling the white remains of a fish. Further splashing and hiding before I realise that there are two animals, playful siblings. A further dive and they are gone as I catch sight of a solitary tail emerging from the river as they pass downriver. All over in a couple of minutes, this chance encounter with an iconic mammal has raised my spirits and vindicated my choice. Buoyed by this experience, I continue my walk along the path and move closer to the coast. In the more open surroundings, I struggle in the gale-force wind. Bird calls are replaced by the collective moaning of creaking trees, whilst the background roar of the thunderous waves grows step by step. The rain is now horizontal and I am happy to reach the safety of the bus-shelter. Time to dry out and enjoy.

Not yet the middle of January and everyone has had enough of the unforgiving rain. The valley is flooded and the footpath struggles to function especially at the northern end. As the river wrestles with the top of the bridge, trees stand hopeless in this temporary wetland and adopt a primeval appearance. It would not surprise me to see an alligator, but a mewing Buzzard spoils the moment as it circles above. Wood Pigeons are content in the tree-tops, but smaller birds are ominously absent save the

persistent Robins. As I peer into the watery vastness, I note a few Mallards swimming contentedly amongst the trees, no longer confined to ponds and river which have coalesced. The fast current is still visible, even audible as the river races to the sea, but for the ducks it is a rare freedom to enjoy this extension to their habitat away from the usual dangers. On my return, I pause at the ditch besides the path hopefully to witness an annual event. Sure enough, a few clumps of frogspawn are there, a real sign of the mild weather. There is some movement and I count four frogs too. For them there is no lack of water, but I hope they survive any low temperatures that are forecast.

A big THANK YOU to all who have contributed to our village's fundraising campaign supporting our local Liskeard and Looe Food Bank inc Rame & Torpoint. The very enjoyable concert organised by Whitsand Harmony choir in mid-December raised £2,323.45 and a further £721.31 has since been banked, post concert and via the DaSRA Appeal. DaSRA Treasurer, Raj Chotai is building a close relationship with the team at the Food Bank and liaises with them every month before buying the items which are identified as priority needs for the Food Bank. This approach enables bulk buying which, to date, has enabled purchases with a retail value of £1802.64 to be bought for £1181.40 - a saving of 35%. The Food Bank values this commitment to monthly purchases as it secures a regular supply of the most requested items which can change depending on donated stock. It is clear that the need for Food Banks is not reducing, so we are asking residents to continue donating as they feel able - with cash/cheques via the DaSRA Post Box in the Shop or by bank transfer. Full details, including a breakdown of monthly donations and expenditure on purchases delivered to the Food Bank are on DaSRA's website. www.dasra.co.uk/campaigns/liskeard-looe-food-bank-support Your generosity is greatly appreciated.

Our Ukrainian families, some of whom have lived in Downderry or Seaton for 9 months, are now facing a new challenge. It is necessary to find a way to transition from their current, temporary host-housing arrangements into more permanent accommodation. It is possible to do this as one mother and young daughter have successfully found a new home, new school and new job in Exeter, but it is not easy. The housing crisis is affecting everyone, not just Ukrainian refugees. There is a severe shortage of affordable rental properties in Cornwall, including in our area. Social housing and emergency housing options are very VERY limited. We are appealing to anyone who has, or knows of, potential rented accommodation that could be made available either in Downderry, or possibly Torpoint, where two of our Ukrainian women have found jobs. One priority is to find accommodation in Downderry from 31st March to 25th July for a mother and daughter so that the child can complete her school year at St Nicolas School. This would be more of "light-touch" hosting as all the necessary paperwork etc is in place; there is advice and support available to anyone who is able to host a family or rent accommodation. This season we plan to install an additional boat at the junction of Trerieve and Top Road. We have obtained a grant from South West Water to install water butts in order to reduce the amount of water drawn from the mains. For example, Amazon is a trusted global platform, and used by so many. Scammers take advantage of that relationship. The latest list from Neighbourhood Watch lists so many scams in the name of Amazon, all designed to encourage victims to make a payment or enter personal details. Suffice it to say, the best way to protect yourself from fake Amazon scams is to never provide personal information over the phone and don't click on links in suspicious emails. If it seems too good to be true, it probably is!

We picked this latest scam affecting mobile phones from Radio 4 Money Box. Thieves observe you inputting your phone pin code. They then mug you for your phone and use the phone to access your mobile banking app. The best advice is to use facial recognition on your phone, and don't use the same pin for phone and banking app. Also don't store all your passwords on the Notes on your phone.

A Happy New Year from the Downderry Community Bus to all our passengers, supporters and volunteers. We look forward to welcoming you on board again soon.

This month in addition to our regular weekly services to Plymouth (every Tuesday) and to Liskeard (every Thursday), we will be visiting Looe on Monday February 3, Truro on Wednesday February 15, and Trago Mills on Friday February 17. The usual departure time for our services is 09.30 starting from Broads Yard, Downderry with all the normal pick up points along the way. **Please note** that the Looe service departs at 11.30, to allow time for a leisurely lunch and any shopping with a return time of 15.00.

St Germans & Area Public Transport Group

There are three major topics for you to think about: public transport needs shown by our survey, community buses, and trains. We're looking for new members to help with ideas about public transport generally, and you may have some specific thoughts - do get in touch if you want to chat about possibilities (a.cousins345@btinternet.com).

<u>Community Buses</u>. We've been told recently by Cornwall Council and Plymouth City Bus that there are no plans to revive a Go Cornwall bus route through St Germans. You'll see above that the Downderry Community bus continues to thrive, and will continue to call at St Germans and Polbathic (Tuesdays to Plymouth, and Thursdays to Liskeard). A number of people have been finding that very useful.

<u>Public Transport Needs.</u> We garnered lots of ideas from the survey in the summer, and need to build on those in order to develop plans for local areas, so that buses, community buses and trains work as an integrated system. This is happening already in some areas of Cornwall, and we would very much welcome anyone who can help work out local plans. For example, there were people in various places like Downderry and Crafthole, as well as Millbrook, who said in the survey that they need to get to St Germans station. It is important to find out further details about the times and the frequency they need to travel, their destination and their return journeys. The same goes for using public transport to other destinations. It would be useful to get information which could become the basis for building up new integrated services.

<u>Trains</u>. The current St Germans station timetable started in December. You can generally find copies at the station, in Downderry Stores and in St Germans Community Shop. Get in touch if you need one. The latest news from GWR is that they have to adhere to the government mandate in the process of resolving the industrial action. There continue to be new developments on the rail network, and progress is being made - slowly - to lessen the carbon footprint. For example, some of the older diesel trains are being phased out and more trains are being converted to being battery-driven. Although there is a commitment to maintaining timetables so far as possible, government funding is being reduced, and 'efficiencies' are therefore having to be made in the coming months and years. Thus, it sounds as though the May timetable is unlikely to bring improvements.

Bread & Babes has now settled into 2023 and we have got a few big, exciting plans for the year. We're delighted that Bread and Babes is one of the Warm Welcome activities now being offered at The Zone this winter.
