

Stepping away from the path and looking beyond the immediate cover of surrounding vegetation can bring immense rewards. In this afternoon busy with walkers, I watch for sudden movements in trees across the river. A few ivy leaves move and there is a Redwing feeding on berries. Then a tiny bird high in the canopy draws my attention. It is restless, hovers fleetingly and keeps disappearing behind branches. Soon the Goldcrest reveals itself, even allowing a moment to focus on its yellow crown. The closeness of the trees gives shelter from the easterly wind and the sun is able to penetrate the leafless branches, raising the temperature just a little for our smallest bird. Another bird joins it, behaving similarly, but I quickly realize that this is a Firecrest, the close relative. It is fractionally larger and sports a white stripe above the eye and an ochrous patch on the side of the neck. Thankfully, this minute beauty flies across the river and feeds on a low branch within a few metres. Then, in a second or two, it has gone.

Further along the path, I come to a pond, rather overgrown and from a distance quite uninteresting. Something makes me take a closer look and I walk to the edge, casting my gaze towards the unshaded area hidden from the path. A small, white object moves jerkily across the surface, a small feather, perhaps. Then the surface is full of white reflections and they are noisy — croaking frogs! I count over sixty individuals and I assume that most are males since I cannot see any pairs. One frog enters the pond from the surrounding grass and wants some of the action. I creep closer and the frogs go quiet and most dive. There is plenty of spawn and the frogs are wading through it. I leave them in peace and return to the path.

Further along, at the next pond, I hear a rare sound emanating from the reeds. It is loud and resembles a squealing piglet. The call is repeated, then stops and does not restart. This is the voice of a Water Rail, a secretive aquatic bird with a long, red bill. It frequents marshy vegetation and is very difficult to see. It does not breed here but arrives as a very uncommon winter visitor, having flown through the night. I walk around the side of the pond and stand quietly in the hope that the bird leaves the sanctuary of the reeds. It rarely flies in the day, but if I am lucky it will scurry

across a gap in the vegetation. Patience is essential, but this time I wait in vain for some minutes. The rail remains hidden. Nevertheless, in a couple of hours I have had three welcome encounters with wildlife just metres from the path, but beyond the gaze and attention of most walkers.

## **News from New County Hall**

I know from my workload that the cost of living and housing crisis is putting much pressure on many families. It has also hit local businesses with rises in energy costs of between 170% and 300% which is pushing prices to maintain financial stability. These are tough times with rates and business rates rising about 5%, household energy bills rising and the list goes on. My wish is that you will support local businesses and trades to help them through these troubled times.

As many of you will already know, new car parking charges are being considered with both Looe and Seaton being in Band A which means the doubling of some charges. This will hit residents and visitors alike and my fear is that many will park in residential areas causing many more problems. A consultation will be carried

out from the 2nd March to the 23rd March 2023 by Cornwall Council on these proposals. I will make sure that when the consultation starts it will be on all the local social media sites. All I ask is that you make your feelings known; either for or against.

Currently on the best information I can find there are about 600 residents who travel from the Liskeard/Looe area to work in Plymouth daily. The costs of using both the bridge and ferries to cross the Tamar recently went up to by 30%. It is now further proposed to ask government about raising these charges yearly by RPI. With much of our health needs delivered in Derriford these extra charges hit us all. I would appreciate your comments on this proposal as it is important to get residents view. ## **Patient Participation Group (PPG)**

Not all patients are able to access information online or see the practice website, so we thought we would bring some of this valuable information to you in the Nut Tree.

The Community Gateway - The Gateway is open from 8 am to 8 pm, seven days a week, 365 days a year. It has been formed in response to increasing living costs and pressures across the health and care system in Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly. This unique partnership of more than 50 voluntary organisations has been working with NHS Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly Integrated Care Board, to offer ongoing support to communities across the Duchy. The Community Gateway is a dedicated telephone line available for everyone and provides access to a wide range of professional, voluntary sector support and services. It will provide a 'gateway to independence', working with people to identify needs and put appropriate packages of support in place.

People can access the Gateway via a dedicated telephone line (01872 266383), and email address: <a href="mailto:gateway@ageukcornwall.org.uk">gateway@ageukcornwall.org.uk</a> to speak to trained staff and find local support that's right for them. In addition, staff members in the community will be available to offer one-to-one and group support.

#### **Practice Information**

Tests and Results - Please ring Reception on telephone 01503 230088 after 10am (results will not be given out before 10.00 am due to the pressure on the telephones before this time):

- Blood Tests please wait 1 week before telephoning for results
- X-Rays please wait 10-14 days before telephoning for results

The receptionist will pass on a message from the GP or nurse if a result is outside the 'reference range' or requires further action. Blood tests often produce results outside the 'reference range', we often repeat these tests to establish if there is a problem or not. If a result is sufficiently abnormal to cause any immediate medical concerns the doctor will contact you themselves. If a doctor wants to discuss a test result where there is no significant level of concern, they may ask reception to book you in for a routine telephone call.

**Tests ordered by Hospital Consultants:** These results do not return routinely to the practice but to the consultant ordering them. It is the consultant's responsibility to act on the results and to let you know the results. If you have not been given the results you should telephone the consultant's secretary. If you do not have their telephone number the hospital switchboard will be able to put you through.

**Hospital Waiting lists** are not within our control — Quay Lane Surgery cannot influence, chase or speed up hospital appointments, even if we have referred a patient. Contact from us will not expedite when you will be seen, as the hospital triages all appointments. Please do not ask to speak to a GP regarding expediting a hospital appointment unless your condition has significantly changed since you were initially referred. Anyone waiting for a hospital appointment, operation or treatment, can now access the NHS My Planned Care Patient Digital Platform: <a href="https://www.myplannedcare.nhs.uk/">https://www.myplannedcare.nhs.uk/</a> As well as giving you advice and support whilst you prepare for your appointment the service also gives information about waiting times.

Over the last year or so, DaSRA has become aware of examples of construction works, often related to noise, that have been causing some nuisance and annoyance among our residents. Recently on Facebook, a complaint about

hammering noise connected with construction early in the morning was causing real annoyance to residents. Other examples have resulted in unexpected road closures with no prior warning to neighbours. These incidents could be avoided if more consideration is given to minimise any adverse impact that building works are having on the local community. Is it time for all residents to develop and adopt a village Code of Conduct for local building contractors and residents? Would you like to help draft such a document? The generosity of local residents continues to provide support for our local Liskeard and Looe Food Bank including Rame & Torpoint. This fundraising initiative was launched at a successful pre-Christmas Whitsand Harmony concert. Donations can still be made via DaSRA's Postbox in Downderry Stores. Funds raised in Downderry & Seaton have totalled £3,162. Raj Chotai, DaSRA treasurer, is working closely with the Food Bank team to identify priority items. By bulk-buying he has already increased the value of goods bought by 31%. A monthly purchase plan is proving to be an effective approach, as it enables the Food Bank team to rely confidently on the supply of household goods that are in greatest demand. In February, Raj spent £498.90 and bought goods with a retail value of £725.22. In total, to date, purchases have totalled £1,680 with a retail value of £2,528. We hear of the continuing need for Food Banks nationally, and we know that local families are benefitting directly from the Liskeard and Looe Food Bank, so we are appealing to residents to donate, as they feel able, with cash/cheques via the DaSRA Postbox in the shop or by bank transfer. ## Neighbourhood Watch in partnership with DaSRA

Fraudalent Vehicle Tax demands by emails: Downderry and Seaton Neighbourhood Watch has been passed a copy of a fraudulent email which was sent to a local resident using his personal email address. It purports to come from Driver and Vehicle Licence Support - govuk-dvla-regtax- with an email added - 4@willes.... and seeks payment by debit or credit card. It looks authentic and is designed to create worry that a car is no longer taxed. If you receive one of these malicious phishing emails, please forward to report@phishing.gov.uk which enables the national Cyber Security Centre to take down the site and avoid other people falling foul to this scam. Please also be aware that scammers are highly likely to target the good will of those wishing to donate to the Earthquake disaster emergency appeal. Stay alert! Information on this and more full news including top tips on home security see NW newsletter which can be found on our website.

<u>Cyber Crime.</u> Three major predictions for 2023: 1. Ransomware will become an increasingly serious problem 2. Scams will continue to be a favourite method for cyber criminals 3. Cybercrime as a business will become even more sophisticated.

How to protect yourself against scams 1. Research companies and websites before buying. No matter how urgent the offer may seem, or how badly you want the item or service, do your research first. 2. Pay with a credit card or trusted payment processor. Compared to debit cards and bank transfers, credit cards are far more secure. 3. Avoid unknown links and downloads. Scammers can use attachments and websites to infect your computer with malware. 4. Keep personal information to yourself. Many websites ask you to answer a series of security questions in case you need to recover your password. Remember which information you've set as security measures, and don't share it. 5. Secure yourself online. If a website offers twofactor authentication, use it. It's not bulletproof, but it's better than nothing. Use strong, unique passwords on the websites you frequent, and store them more securely with a dependable password manager.

## Simple Ways to Save the Planet

What an uncharacteristically wintery winter we had this year. One thing I noticed is how much later our snowdrops were to flower. The same was true of our daffodils and crocus. Between hard frosts, temperatures soared. One day saw the thermometer going from minus five to mid teens in a few hours. This is problematic for wildlife, which wakes up thinking spring is here, only to find no food and to be greeted by the return of an often fatal hard frost a few weeks later.

The 2019 State of Nature report says that since 1970 41% of all UK species have declined. There is no doubt that modern agricultural practices have played a large part in this, but so too has the changing climate. Spring has moved forward over the last few years. A recent study by the Met Office has estimated the growing season is now a month longer than it was between 1961 to 1990, as autumn is delayed and spring is earlier.

I would love to believe one cold winter was a sign things are returning to 'normal' However looking at statistics we can see that the 10 hottest years since records began have all occurred since 2002. We've also seen more extreme weather events, and greater flooding. There have of course been exceptions throughout history. We had a little ice age between the 17th and 19th centuries and a great storm in 1703 that caused thousands of deaths. But freak events do happen. It is the frequency of these events that is important. A graph of the temperatures throughout the ages still shows fairly small fluctuations in temperature, from -0.5 to 0.5 until the middle of the twentieth century, after which we are presented with a hockey stick effect when suddenly the graph rises quickly upwards.

What can we do? Firstly we really do need to stop burning fossil fuels and reduce our mileage for food, for clothes, for holidays, for white goods, for everything. We need to start using what we already have in the system by buying secondhand and mending. We need to help wildlife in ways we can; planting hedges and building habitat for dormice, reptiles, birds, hedgehogs and hibernating creatures. We need to be mindful that what we are building now is resilience. The genie is out of the pot and we are going to have to be creative in managing it. And manage it we must, for the future of our own survival depends upon it.
