

#### **Nature Notes**

It is dawn but the blackened sky would suggest otherwise. Night and day merge as one below the low cloud and murk remaining from earlier rain. A storm has been slowly progressing northward from sodden Iberia and more heavy rain is forecast here. The breeze is becoming easterly but it is still remarkably mild for November. At home many plants are still growing and flowers of geranium and cosmos, for example, still persist, helping to add a bit of colour to the autumnal gloom. I catch the dependable winter song of the Robin and the weak ticking of a Wren. A Grey Wagtail flies over calling loudly. A few days ago, on a much brighter day, I came across the first Black Redstart of the autumn. It has probably flown over from the continent, but has now moved on. There are still plenty of insects around too, notably on the flowers of the evergreen Castor Oil plant.

As I look out to sea, there are few birds. I note scarce appearances from Gannet, Razorbill and Guillemot, though the commonest species seems to be the Cormorant. Perhaps the beach will offer something different. A couple of Little Egrets fly westward just offshore and I interrupt the feeding activity of several Pied Wagtails, many already paired for next spring. I hope to see a Water Pipit, a winter visitor from the Alps, which I encountered a few days ago. Usually, I come across one each year in Downderry. Yet my interest is drawn quickly to what is at my feet, not the

accumulations of dark seaweed but the more reflective outlines of tiny plastic-like pieces of debris. However, these are not offending bits of plastic.

Along the high-tide line are thousands of the translucent floats of the By-the-wind Sailor, or velella, a type of colonial, free-floating animal similar to jellyfish. It is an innocuous creature, a distant relative of the Portuguese Man o' War. Each float is about five centimetres long, oval in shape with circular, smooth ridges. It includes a sail that crosses the float diagonally. In recent storms, the wind has pushed these floats ashore in incalculable numbers, an occurrence not unfamiliar in Devon and Cornwall. Each float belonged to a deep blue animal, a complexity in itself, whose stinging tentacles would have caught plankton out in the warmer ocean. Unfortunately, the float is all we normally find.

The meandering line seems to go on forever, mirroring the high point reached by the swash of the waves. As I follow the line, inevitably, I come across other objects on the beach, but many are unwelcome. They are discarded and I do my bit to remove a few. Yet, one large piece leaves a deep impression on me. It is an empty plastic bottle, once the carrier of pure water according to the label. I read on and the small print reveals that it originated in Singapore. Now that in itself conjures up another story.

#### St Germans Parish Council

Many residents will have noticed that the three-cornered field adjacent to St Germans station is currently being used for what appears to be ongoing and unlawful tipping of excavation waste in a conservation area and the Tamar Valley Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB).

The Parish Council are endeavouring to stop this activity and have contacted the relevant authorities requesting that they investigate and take appropriate action to stop the tipping and return the field to its previous natural condition. Some residents have already lodged their own complaints, and it would be helpful if anyone who is concerned about this activity could also contact the authorities to log a complaint.

On a more positive note, National Highways have signed off on the pedestrian crossing at Tideford, and the work will also include a 'yellow box' so that westbound traffic will have to stop and keep the road opposite the junction clear to enable cars to pull out.

Residents of St Germans will have noticed that the broken section of wall next to the triangle at Fancy Bridge has been repaired and that the footpath is now open again.

There is a problem with people pushing glass bottles into the soil at the burial ground. It is centred around one grave in particular, so if anyone reading this knows who is responsible, please ask them to stop and dispose of their bottles in the bin. It is dangerous and means that the grass around the grave can not be cut because it could lead to smashed glass being spread around and it endangers the people maintaining the graveyard.

The Parish Council would like to express our sincere thanks to Patricia Pipe, who has served on the Council for many years, and for a long time has been our Chair. She is moving away from the area, and we wish her every happiness in her new surroundings. We therefore have four vacancies for new councillors, one for Bethany ward, one for St Germans ward, one for Tideford and one for St Germans. This is not a time-consuming commitment and we welcome all members of the community, whatever their age and background, to apply.

#### The Rame Peninsula and St Germans

As we reach the end of 2025, I find myself reflecting on what has been a fast-paced and productive year. The first half was dominated by the local elections, and I was absolutely honoured to be re-elected to serve you for another four years as your Cornwall Councillor. Since then, it has been full steam ahead — working on casework, supporting residents, and continuing to push for projects that make a real difference across our communities.

As residents will be aware, we recently had a consultation on the proposed pedestrian crossing in Tideford Village – this was really well responded to and I am delighted to say it was overwhelmingly supported which means that Cornwall Council has signed this project off and it moves to the next stage. There are a few hoops to jump through still, but all being well we should see this being installed in the early part of 2026, finally making the A38 safer and easier for residents to cross. This is something I have been calling for for several years now, and have worked hard alongside the brilliant Safe38 to bring this to fruition.

In other news, the safety review of the A374 is nearing completion – this has been a long project to get completed but the early sightings I have had of the report look promising in terms of making the villages along the route safer for all. There is still a way to go on this but I will keep folk updated.

For those of you who enjoy walking, cycling or running in our beautiful corner of Cornwall, I would encourage you to take a look at the Walk, Wheel, Cycle Trust's online mapping tool. They are gathering ideas on how to make active travel safer and more accessible — not just for now, but to help shape future funding bids and identify physical barriers that make getting around difficult. November seems to have been a month of roadworks, treeworks, road redirections and power cuts in Hessenford; hopefully all now behind us for a while. The repair to the Village Hall wall that collapsed into the river is complete and we can expect work to remove the yew tree and repair the wall outside the Church to start in 2026. 
<u>Inn on the Shore</u> - Toast marshmallows on the fire pits while enjoying a mulled wine or mulled cider.
